#### Overview

The Refugee Survival Trust (RST) Board members, who are the directors and trustees of the charitable company, are pleased to present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

#### Chair's Report & Summary

2019-2020 was another busy and challenging year for the Refugee Survival Trust. We continued to deliver our programmes successfully, developed our focus on capacity building within the organisation, refreshed our vision, mission and aims, and began work on developing our new organisation structure.

We've done a lot of work on our finance systems, moving to professional accounting software. This puts us in a better place for funding applications and audits.

It is worth noting that the period covered by this report ended just as the fundamental significance of COVID-19 had become apparent, a week after the country entered lockdown. This crisis was naturally to change some things dramatically for RST, with the consequent impact to be covered in the next annual report. At this point it can be reported that RST is weathering the storm well.

There continued to be high demand for our Destitution Grants in 2019-2020. A total of 1692 grants were given in the year, the highest number of grants in RST history. Out of those 1692 grants, 1213 were destitution grants while 479 were travel grants. The total destitution grant expenditure for 2019-2020 surpassed £100,000 for a third year in a row, reaching a record value of £126,376. Destitution grants are given to people seeking asylum, as a last resort when they receive no other type of support and refugees up to 6 months after they are granted refugee status. A weekly destitution grant is £36 for adults and £40 for children, which can be received for up to two consecutive weeks.

Our Destitute Asylum Seeker Service (DASS) project continued its unique multi-agency holistic approach to working with people seeking asylum and experiencing long-term destitution and homelessness. The project provides temporary and emergency accommodation, legal support, casework and financial aid to help people move forward out of destitution.

We continued the distribution of our daily bus passes to allow people to, for example, attend important meetings, get to the food bank and to meet friends and attend community events. Mobility is crucial to the asylum application process and to be an active citizen in Scotland.

The Bump and Baby bus pass scheme was introduced in 2019, through which those seeking asylum who are pregnant, or who have recently had a baby, can apply for a 10-week bus pass. The only criteria are that the applicant is in the asylum process and that the bus pass starts up to 7 weeks before or after the birth of their child.

The Wee Welcome parent and toddler group was also new in 2019, giving refugees, people seeking asylum and other parents in Glasgow the chance to meet up in a diverse group from around the world, offering peer support, particularly to refugees, to build community connections.

The Office Internship programme for people seeking asylum and refugees continued in its second year of multi-year funding with good feedback and results, helping develop skills whilst also assisting RST.

The Board continued its period of renewal to strengthen governance. Working with the Cranfield Trust through its partnership with our funder the Oak Foundation, we appointed a pro bono consultant to lead on a strategic review of our organisation and our work. An early action was the introduction of new financial systems during the year to enable us to have a clearer understanding of the costs of our activities, our financial health and goals. Subsequently we developed our plans for a restructure of the organisation and by the end of the year we were successful in securing multi-year funding to create a new role of Chief Executive.

Our total income in 2019-2020 was £670,316. Over the same period our expenditure was £627,259. The income recognised this year included significant income for the next cycle of DASS.

#### Structure, governance and management

The Refugee Survival Trust is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and is a registered Scottish charity. The company is governed by the terms of its Memorandum and Articles of Association, last updated in January 2020.

The appointment of the Board members (who are the directors of the company and trustees of the charity) is approved each year at the Annual General Meeting, in accordance with the procedure outlined in the charity's Memorandum and Articles. One third of the Board retire from office each year and are eligible for reappointment for a further term of three years. All members of the Board are members of the charitable company and no member has any contract with the charity.

The names of those who have served as directors and trustees during the financial year are shown in the Reference and Administrative section.

#### Risk Management

Risk is the uncertainty of outcome from actions or events which could hamper our ability to achieve our objectives.

The Board of trustees/Company Directors are accountable to our members for ensuring the Refugee Survival Trust manages its risks effectively. The Board carefully considers the way RST manages and mitigates the risks which could adversely impact RST's ability to deliver its objectives and has identified actions to strengthen its current risk management. Procedures and processes have been reviewed and a risk register, which lists our top risks, has been created. All risks have mitigation measures in place to reduce the potential impact to an acceptable level wherever possible and the Board reviews the risk register every quarter. Lack of funding remains one of RST's major risks as demand for RST's services has increased.

The Trustees recognise that the COVID-19 pandemic presents a significant risk and will require urgent review of the Risk Register and the development of a mitigation strategy.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Destitute Asylum Seeker Service (DASS)

Our Destitute Asylum Seeker Service (DAŚS) has been operational for 5 years and works with people seeking asylum who are homeless and living without financial support. We deliver the work in partnership with a range of other organisations which allows us to offer a holistic service and routes out of destitution.

This year DASS provided casework, advocacy, legal support, emergency shelter and temporary accommodation to 346 destitute people seeking asylum. It was another busy year for the project, working with people from 44 different countries around the world, with 81% of our service users being male and 19% being female.

Key achievements and performance from 2019-20 for the Destitute Asylum Seeker Service:

- 120 people stayed at the night shelter
- 9 people stayed in community based temporary accommodation
- 37 people worked with the law clinic team
- 79 people were referred to specialist health services/social work assessments
- 194 people were referred to food services
- 149 people were assisted with Section 4 applications
- 114 people were assisted with fresh asylum claims
- 108 people returned to Home Office accommodation
- 16 people achieved Leave to Remain status

#### **Destitution Grants**

For clarity it is important to explain the difference between a person seeking asylum, who is seeking international protection but whose claim for refugee status has not yet been determined and a refugee, who is someone who has been recognised as such under the 1951 Refugee Convention.

Destitution grants are given to people seeking asylum, and refugees up to six months after they are granted refugee status, as a last resort when they receive no other type of support. A weekly destitution grant which can be received for up to two consecutive weeks.

In 2019-20 a total of 1692 grants were given, the highest number of grants in RST history. 1213 were destitution grants while 479 were travel grants. The total destitution grant expenditure surpassed £100,000 for a third year in a row, reaching a record sum of £126,376.

The following Word Cloud is a visual representations of RST applicants' countries of origin for all grants. In the Word Cloud the number of grants is indicated by the size of the country's name.



in 2019-20, 225 families (13.3% of all applicants) with a total of 430 children benefited from the grants that were distributed. The number increased again after dropping in the previous year, which is a worrying trend, but not reaching the 2017-2018 all-time high of 472. However, the number is still high and out of those 430 children only 130 had refugee status (or humanitarian protection or Discretionary Leave to Remain) while 50 were homeless.

#### **Bus Passes**

Once again RST distributed daily bus passes to allow individuals to, for example, attend important meetings, get to the food bank and to meet friends and attend community events. Mobility is crucial to the asylum application process and enables the individual to be an active citizen within an integrated society.

In 2019 we built on our existing daily bus pass programme by introducing a new Bump and Baby Bus Pass scheme, through which people seeking asylum who are pregnant or who have recently had a baby can apply for a 10-week bus pass.

In 2019-2020 a total of 66 bus passes were given to mothers with a total value of £7,157.80 The average age of applicants was 29. Most applicants (50) were awaiting the initial decision on their asylum application.

#### Out of those 66 mothers:

- 4 were homeless (6%)
- 41 were single parents (62%)
- 4 had a physical health condition (6%)
- 5 had a mental health condition (7.6%)
- 28 had other children (42%) Total number of other children: 45

#### Access to Education and Employment Grants

Refugees and people seeking asylum who want to study or work can apply to RST for an Access to Education and Employment grant of up to £150 to overcome any barriers to starting a course or a job. Such costs might include translation of qualifications, course materials, exam fees or travel to college or interviews.

In 2019-20 we awarded 96 grants, a total of £11,965, 49% to women and 51% to men from 26 different countries. The range of courses and jobs was wide, demonstrating the valuable contribution that refugees and people seeking asylum make to our communities and economy.

In total, we have awarded more than 700 grants over the past 11 years of the programme.

#### Office Internship Programme

In 2018-19 we received funding from Impact Funding Partners to continue our internship programme for a further three years. Through the programme we've welcomed people seeking asylum and refugees into our office as interns for seven-week placements.

In 2019-20, 12 participants undertook the program with a renewed focus from December 2019 which centred around the provision of individually tailored assignments, primarily of a research nature. We recruited a specialist IT volunteer to support our interns. Their work to assist our interns was invaluable.

Feedback from participants demonstrated how the programme:

- · increased levels of confidence
- provided opportunities to practice communication skills
- enabled participants to build on their IT Skills
- · gave a sense of belonging in the country and more involvement in the community
- developed public speaking skills

#### Following the completion of the programme:

- two interns have enrolled in college
- one intern remains at university
- three interns are looking for work

#### The Wee Welcome

This parent and toddler programme commenced in July 2019 and is open to people seeking asylum and refugee families, as well as families more established locally, to help develop links, communication and peer support. Over the course of the year there were over 20 participants in attendance with their children. Participants came from 12 countries: Scotland, Germany, Azerbaijan, China, Namibia, Uganda, Sudan, Iran, Spain, Nigeria, Zimbabwe, and Iran.

The project formed a partnership with the Language Hub, a social enterprise operating for the benefit of the local community in Glasgow and beyond, to provide innovative and creative learning and work opportunities that promote and enable cultural exchange between individuals and communities. This new partnership gave us access to a warm and welcoming base complete with on-site children's reading/play facilities and cafe.

In January 2020 the Wee Welcome family saw more Scottish families join the group in Partick. The geographical spread of the participants was from all over the city from Castlemilk, Maryhill, Govan, Partick, Gorbals, Hillingdon, Parkhead, Springburn, Royston, Lenzie, Scotstoun, and Tollcross.

Highlights of the year included a group trip to Edinburgh; a beach clear-up day in Troon and a fun Xmas party complete with visit from Santa.

#### Statistical analysis

We collect an incredible amount of data through our different programmes, which provides an invaluable insight into the extent and causes of destitution amongst refugees in Scotland. We use this analysis to provide evidence for our research, updates for our partners, stories for our press releases and as feedback for our own work and how we can improve our current services.

#### **Events and Fundraising**

One way we raise awareness and generate funds is through events, both organised by RST and put on by our hugely appreciated volunteers and supporters. Highlights from this year include a live comedy night at The Stand in Glasgow and a very lively ceilidh evening hosted by the Ceilidh Collective. A big thank you to staff and Board members who attend events to support RST.

Our Board member Monojit spoke passionately about the need to prepare for the impact of climate refugees and received a great response from the audience of around 300 people at the ceilidh.

#### Volunteers

The Charity is supported by volunteers including its Board of Directors, who all provide their services on a voluntary basis and for this, the charity is indebted to them.

#### RST in the media

We believe that media coverage is one of the most effective ways of sharing information about our work, and the issues faced by our beneficiaries, with a wider audience. To that end we regularly produce press releases and statistics and share with a wide range of press and media contacts. Our work was picked up by outlets such as The Guardian, The National, The Ferret and Third Force News.

#### Research and Influencing Policy

RST continues to conduct and commission research and participate in the national policy debate on asylum. It has had significant success in bringing about changes in procedures affecting refugees and people seeking asylum, for example:

- Providing UKBA (now UK Home Office) with evidence on the destitution of new mothers living on Section 4 support which contributed to UKBA introducing one-off maternity grants of £250 for new mothers.
- Working with Job Centre Plus to encourage them to establish a dedicated team of trained benefits caseworkers equipped to work with refugees. This team dramatically reduced the number of destitute people awaiting mainstream benefits until autumn 2010 when it was disbanded.
- Encouraging the Scottish Government to fund work to support refugees into employment.

#### Partnership working

All our work is rooted in strong partnerships, including the DASS project, which is a partnership project, and our grants programmes, which are all delivered via partners.

We continue to be active members in a range of local, national and UK-wide networks, including the Glasgow Asylum Destitution Action Network (GLADAN), the Scottish Asylum Stakeholder Forum group (SASF) with the Home Office, the Third Sector Forum with asylum accommodation provider MEARS and the UK-wide No Accommodation Network (NACCOM).

#### Financial review

The income and expenditure for the year is set out in the Statement of Financial Activities (the "SOFA") on page 16, which shows restricted and unrestricted funds in separate columns. This shows an increase of £8,284 in unrestricted funds over the year with a balance of £36,239 carried forward. At the same time the restricted funds have increased by £34,773 with a total of £396,420 carried forward, largely comprising funds of £275,134 held for the DASS project (Destitute Asylum Seeker Service) and £91,634 held for Destitution Grants. There is also a balance of £1,781 held for bus passes, £7,529 Bump & baby, Community Projects £1,818, Fundraising £17,889 and Covid 19 £635. The movement on each separate fund is shown in note 18 on pages 28-29.

Income arose entirely from grants and donations of £669,735, as set out in note 5 on page 24. This included regular grant funding from the British Red Cross (£12,000 receivable this year) and other trust fund donations totalling £93,813 for Destitution Grants. Membership contributions and other donations, together with Gift Aid and other fundraising, amounted to £132,126. A large contribution £385,295 was received from Oak Foundation for the DASS project.

Expenditure increased to £627,259 compared to £475,814 in the previous year. This was mainly due to an increase in the DASS Project expenditure. A detailed analysis of expenditure is shown in note 7 on page 25.

There was an overall increase in funds of £43,057. The main reason for this is the increased funding received during the year for the DASS project and destitution grants.

We are grateful to all our funders and donors for their vital support. We would particularly like to thank all our regular donors, and those who have made donations in response to our newsletters. These funds go directly to our destitution grants, and we would not be able to support the number of people we do without these donations.

#### Reserves Policy

It is Board policy to maintain a three month reserve of core funds. It allows us to meet outstanding obligations should fundraising prove unsuccessful. Amounts held at 31 March 2020 were £36,239.

The Board of Directors will continue to review the reserves policy and will work to increase unrestricted reserves in alignment with risk management and mitigation.

#### Plans for future periods

In the coming year, RST will continue our core work of providing Destitution Grants, as well as Access to Employment and Education Grants and Bus Passes, while also leading the successful DASS project. Generating income and achieving financial sustainability will be a priority in the coming 12 months, as demand increases as well as competition for grants and funding. We will continue to work directly with refugees and people seeking asylum to help them be active citizens in the wider community, through our Office Internships and other projects. We will also continue to educate, raise awareness, campaign and seek to influence policy, both in the public and political realms.

The Board and staff look forward to continuing its work (as part of a package of capacity-building support over the next year funded by the Oak Foundation in their role as major funders of DASS) to review and consider our operations, structures, processes and strategic direction in the light of the recent growth in demand for grants and range of our projects. A renewed clear direction and longer-term strategy will help RST stay true to purpose and apply for funding / grants that fully support that focus and will support future sustainability with the potential for growth. As part of this process, a Chief Executive will improve the management structure of RST and work with the staff team to ensure we define a structure that supports our longer-term strategy and organisational sustainability.

The Board, with its new membership, looks forward to completing its process of strengthening and renewal. The Board plans to focus on the quality of its governance and make any changes that might be required to best support the development of RST. The Board will be prioritising the review of RST's financial situation and looking at measures to improve our reserves position.

#### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Floor 3, Robertson House, 152 Bath Street, Glasgow, G2 4TB.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
  contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
  requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
  it may be regarded as restricted.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
  activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
  support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
  activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

#### **Operating leases**

Lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

#### Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Equipment

33% straight line

#### Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

#### Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

#### Financial instruments (continued)

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

#### **Defined contribution plans**

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

#### **DASS** project

The Destitute Asylum Seeker Service ('DASS') project is described in the trustees' report. The main grant funder for this fund is The Oak Foundation, who awarded £385,295 during the year as part of a 3-year grant award and also a grant of £48,301 was received from the Nationwide. This is a partnership project - RST is the lead partner and makes payments to the other partners for their share of the work

**Destitution grants, A TO EE grants, Bus Passes, Bump&Baby** Destitution grants and other forms of direct support to individuals have been funded by donations from individuals, as well as grants and donations from a number of different organisations, trusts and funds (see note 2).

#### **Community Projects & Events**

The community projects includes a befriending project which received contributions from Sharing Lives Sharing Languages to support the development and delivery of befriending services for people seeking asylum. Also within community projects the charity received contributions from Impact Funding Partners) towards fundraising for an internship scheme within RST.
